HAULING SEASON IS HERE

Hauling season is upon us...that's right warmer weather, more daylight, longer days, and hopefully nice dry ground! Many of us who finally gave up this past winter, threw in the towel and said forget it till spring...now are fighting to get our horses legged up and ready to run. We all know our Mile Hi Summer Series is kicking off real soon. So we are running out of time.

Now is the time to also think about your feeding program for the summer. 2010 AWARDS PROGRAM

Our 2010 Winter Series Awards is just around the corner.....with the conclusion of the Winter Series at our barrel race February 27-28, 2010 at The Ranch. It was at this event that many solidified their position.....some moved into Winter Series Championship positions while others just slipped out.

It is this time of year that many get confused or question the final position placings...so with that in mind I thought it would be beneficial to remind everyone of a few issues with respect to the Award Placings.

- First, points are tracked on the same **HORSE/RIDER combination**: in the **Novice Horse, Futurity & Derby**. Simply stated, these classes are designed with the horse in mind—we do NOT allow others to ride the horse and apply points to just the horse – we did that the first year and it doesn't work. It creates more CHAOS and problems than you can even imagine.
- Next, points are tracked on the **RIDER in the Novice Rider/50+/Youth/Open/Junior**. **UNLESS you paid multiple nomination fees and nominated more than one horse to earn points**. In this case, horse/rider are tracked separately by the horse(s) nominated.
 - Those who pay multiple nomination fees could in all reality end up winning multiple awards because their horses end up placing in multiple positions.
- Of importance, If you have only one horse or paid only one nomination and fall in more than one "D", you will finish or receive awards ONLY IN THE "D" you have the most points in. Regardless of the award placing! This applies to ALL Standings (Winter, Summer, and Year End) and all classes that are based on the rider that have "D's" (Novice Horse/Youth/Open).

It's important to note that in the classes that have "D's" there are a significant number of folks who do have points spread across multiple "D's" and in most cases they end up sort of surfacing in one. However, there are many times where an individual may have more points in one D and would be in the Award Position (ie: Top 10 in the Open) yet have more points in another D that is NOT in the award position (ie: maybe they are 11,12 or beyond in another D). It is a very unfortunate situation but in this case, the individual would NOT receive an award, because the D they have the most points in is not enough to be in the award position.

The above situation is always a sad one and is difficult for us because everyone wants to receive an award. Unfortunately, awards are based on our point system and how you finished in most cases.

It's also very important to note that this is not a NEW policy/rule/procedure or whatever you want to refer to as.....we have had this in place since the inception of Mile Hi. We knew up front when you deal with a "D" concept that this issue could occur. So we made every effort to keep it fair and objective. The most points is the determining factor.

In some cases an individual on one horse may end up in multiple D's in Award Position on both...in this case they only receive one award in the D they have the most points in. You can not win multiple awards on the same horse in the same class....basically you paid one membership/nomination you receive one award position. The exception, obviously, is when you pay multiple nominations (ie: Nominate a horse in the Novice Horse and Open and end up in both classes for awards---in this case you would receive an award for the Open and the Novice Horse).

Finally, the number of awards to be presented is indicated to the left of this article.

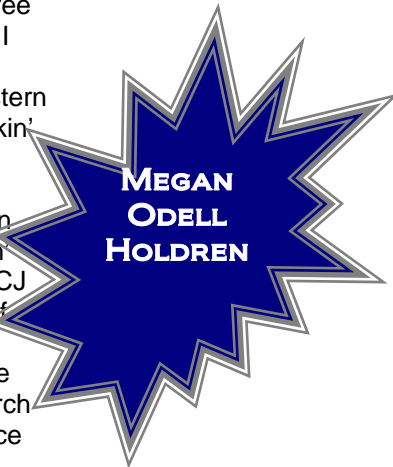

FreeStyle Barrel Racing Returns to Mile Hi

FreeStyle Barrel Racing returns to Mile Hi for 2010. That's right.....for those who haven't heard of it or witnessed it, it's a HOOT! It is cool, creative, and fun!

Mile Hi's FreeStyle Barrel Race is only a month or so away--- Saturday April 17th at The Ranch-Larimer County Fairgrounds in Loveland! This is a FUN fundraising event and all proceeds go toward Year End Awards. This event has become sooooo popular that we have to limit the entries to 10 routines. This is our 4th Year and you will be amazed at how creative, how talented, and how cool this event is.....our riders and horses will surprise you! We currently have 6 folks signed up that means we have only 4 spots left. **None of my family is entered this year so the Peyton factor (the cute little girl and crowd favorite) is not an issue!!!**

Have you ever seen or attended a Free Style Reining Event or figure skating? Wel, FreeStyle Barrel Racing at Mile Hi is similar. That is, you simply pick out the song you want to do a routine too, choreograph your routine, design your costume and practice. There are no restrictions and the only requirement is **you MUST do the barrel pattern somewhere in your routine at a trot or faster.** We don't care what tack (bits, bridles, whatever) you use or don't use. We have no restrictions!!! Just make sure the barrel pattern is included somewhere.

The more difficult elements you add into your routine the better chances you receive for a higher score.....for example a triple toe loop (a spin) will get you more than a double toe loop (just a turn). A sliding stop will get you more points, etc etc etc. You get the idea.....judges are randomly picked from the crowd of spectators staying to watch. No one associated with Mile Hi may judge the event!! So it's your peers saying who wins—and of course the crowd!

The more creative you are the better! The costume says alot! The routine can be totally your design and decision-- just make sure you include the pattern in it somewhere at a trot or faster.

We will be awarding the following:

Best Overall -- that means costume, routine, and creativity.

Crowd Favorite -- which contestant(s) routine and performance did the crowd like the best.

The FreeStyle Barrel Race will begin approximately 30 minutes following the end of the barrel race for that day. We will give you time to get dressed and spruced up, warm up and let us get the payoffs and office done. Then we'll start with the FreeStyle!

You'll need to bring your music on a CD. We are going to ask that you not include anything in your routine like lights having to be shut off -- because it takes approximately 20 minutes for the barn lights to come back on.....so please don't get THAT creative! Any other special accommodations we will try and meet.....but you might want to call me if you end up having special needs in your routine. Yes, someone can read for you should that be included in your skit. Skits are always favorites especially when they tie to what the music is saying or doing! Just a hint!

For those entering, if you want you can come up Friday evening and have a practice run with your music after the AQHA barrel races conclude at approximately 7:30 pm. I won't even charge ya! You can do this at no cost.

To Grandmothers, Grandmas, Nana's, Mema's, Mama's or whatever everywhere--we miss you and we love you!

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, because she only had a few, it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and they used less material, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

For this month, please keep in mind the following:

- **Ride Sessions:** Reservations for Ride Sessions are accepted the **MONDAY** prior to the upcoming event. You simply email me at MileHiBarrelHorse@gmail.com and let me know what session(s) or day(s) you want to reserve a session for. Sessions are offered **Saturday and Sunday** at the following times: **9:00-9:20, 9:20-9:40, and 9:40-10 am.**
- **Jackpot Start Times:** Noon each day, unless otherwise posted on our flyers.
- **Round Pen** – A weekend long side pot for those wanting to play a little more at the barrel race.
