The **“Round Pen”** is a sidepot which encompasses ALL runs from a given weekend and it is open to anyone competing in a Mile Hi Barrel Horse class on a given weekend; all you have to do is enter it! You may enter once or multiple times, it’s up to you (\$20/entry).

The **“Round Pen”** can be considered one big sidepot across both days. Therefore, you can enter multiple times, your Saturday and/or Sunday runs or from multiple classes you might be running in. However many runs you are actually making, you can roll them all over to the **“Round Pen”**. If you’re making multiple runs but only want to enter once in the **“Round Pen”** then you simply tell us which run you want to apply to the **“Round Pen”** sidepot. It’s that easy!

The **“Round Pen”** will feature **\$100 added each weekend** (if we have 20 or more entries) with an entry fee of \$20. ## THE ROUND PEN (CONT)

to the **“Round Pen”**. The payout will be determined based on the number of entries, it will be a 2D if less than 20 entries, 21+ it will be a 3D and 75+ will be a 4D. **And, here’s another aspect that’s different: it’s a .75 split.** So all of you *crack babies* who continually fall in the cracks of a .5 split, here’s your chance---new concept, new idea, new splits and opportunity to win more \$\$\$! What more could you ask for?

So, for example lets say Jane Doe won the open with a 15.487 but she elected not to enter the Round Pen, however Betty Barrel Racer did and her time of a 15.501 was the fastest time of the Round Pen entries.

## Meet The Sponsor ADM Alliance Nutrition -- Ginger Greene



ADM Alliance Nutrition is excited to be a sponsor of Mile Hi Barrel Horse. Ginger Greene is a Mile Hi Barrel Horse Member and also the Equine Specialist for ADM Alliance Nutrition in Colorado, New Mexico, West Texas and Kansas. This company is a combination of 3 companies MoorMan's, Consolidated Nutrition, and Tindle Trails. The equine side has primarily retained the products from the old MoorMan's company, which many of us in this area are familiar with.

The equine program is called "Forage First," and we feed a lot of Champions. Our primary goal is to feed horses in the most natural way possible. ADM Alliance Nutrition wants our products to enhance the forages that are already being fed. We believe in feeding less starch and more high quality fat and fermentable fibers. Two things that Ginger stresses when you are analyzing your feeding programs are: **YOU GET WHAT YOU PAY FOR AND LEARN TO READ THE LABELS!!!!**

Starting with a quality mineral program, standard trace mineral is generally between 75% and 99% salt (read the labels). Mineral is the basis for everything that our equine athletes do, it needs to be next step after water and forage in any diet. Another caution on minerals is know what is in all of your supplements, make sure that they are balanced and that you are not over feeding any mineral, it gets the whole system out of balance.

All of our equine feeds are fixed formulas. This means that when you read our labels it will be a list of ingredients that are identifiable and will always result in the same bag of feed every time. We make several concentrates including Senior Glo (one of the favorites among MHBHA members and so much more than a Senior Horse Feed); PowerGlo, Stay Strong and Patriot 14. When you read any of these labels you will find a fixed formula. An example of a non-fixed formula called a least cost ration would be a feed tag that reads: grain products; forage products; molasses products. This means that the company can include various ingredients and does not insure that each bag of feed is the same. **LEARN TO READ THE LABELS.**

We have been working diligently to improve our distribution in this area. Ginger believes that wherever you are in our area now you should have access to products. If you are having trouble finding products she will work hard to fix that problem and get you working with a dealer who can take care of getting you're the products that you need.

Another very important thing to ADM Alliance Nutrition is that your feeding program "do no harm." In other words we want our feeding program to minimize problems such as colic, equine associated grain disorders, ulcers, insulin resistance, tying up and many others. We are not claiming to be the quick fix to all of these problems but certainly with equine athletes just like human athletes a good nutrition is the basis for optimal performance.

Ginger is an avid barrel racer. Most of you probably know the geldings she hauls now "Cash" and "Beau" and her Jack Russell Button. ## Meet The Member - Becky Swan

***Welcome to "Meet the Member", a new column in the Mile Hi monthly newsletter. We are hoping this will bring our Mile Hi family even closer together. And we hope that each of you will take the time to meet and greet each other at our upcoming events. We are trying to feature multiple members in an effort to maximize the number you can get to know.***

Just about every little girl goes through a phase in their lives where they want a horse. I, Becky Swan, however, was not one of them. It wasn't because I lived in the city either. I grew up in the small mountain town of Salida, Colorado. My mother had made it very clear when the local extension agent came to my elementary school, recruiting people for 4-H, that the horse project was out of the question and I should not even think about it. She had bad allergies around horses. I never gave a horse of my own a second thought. However, it was in my blood because it seemed like everyone I was acquainted with through my life had horses.

The kids I played with in the neighborhood had horses that they kept outside of town, but the trailer was on the street in the neighborhood. We would play in their old straight load two horse trailer all the time. I even locked myself in the tack area once. We would pretend to ride by sitting on the saddles on their racks in the garage. I always thought that was enough.

Just about the time I turned twelve, we had moved out of town to acreage. However, it was not zoned for horses. Horses were still out of the question for me, but I now had a best friend that had horses and if I was going to be interested, I could ride with her. We would ride from her house to mine without ever going near a paved road. I would go with her Wednesday nights in the summer to "roping club." There was a second arena with gymkhana events. I loved the rush of running the barrels.

As the teen years approached I guess my dad thought I needed a hobby to keep me out of trouble. He had a law partner that had horses but nobody to take care of and ride them. So, I got my chance. I was in charge of a sorrel, Shiloh, and a fast and beautiful Palomino Appaloosa whose name was Morning Star. They were green broke and I was a novice rider. I was completely on my own for the first time. I rode them everyday after school and sometimes on the weekends. It was tough for me, but it was the best way to become a good rider very quickly without having a family background of horses. If I wasn't skiing in the winter or hiking and camping in the summer, I was on a horse. My mother got acupuncture treatments so she could tolerate the horses. I joined 4-H raising swine, doing the rodeo project, the horse project and veterinary science with dreams of becoming a veterinarian and a barrel racer.

My dad ended up buying an old two horse trailer that we pulled with our 1975 Toyota Landcruiser. The Toyota still sits on my property today, but my upgrade can't be towed by it anymore. Two years ago, it was very exciting for me when I got my own Truck and Living Quarter Trailer.

I could haul the horses myself and my parents did not have to help. I also worked with a few other people in my high school to get a rodeo team started. Once I was in 4-H and high school rodeo, there were a few months every year where I had no extra time to think about getting into any trouble. My dad was right.

When I went to college, the horses were sold. I came back one summer after several months of not riding a horse and found out that they were gone. I joined the equestrian team in college. College rodeo was not an option at the University of Denver. We trained at High Prairie Farms (Colorado Horse Park) riding showmanship and hunter jumper riding. It just was not the same, but at least I could still ride for awhile. I graduated with a degree in Mass Communications. Studying for science classes was too much.

A few months after graduation, I met my husband, Chip. I was working at KYGO, off air, but operating the boards, attending promotional events as a KYGO face, and playing receptionist for all four radio stations in the building. KYGO had a "singles connections line" that people would always call and ask how to use. I had no idea. So I thought I should try it out to help people. I was not planning on taking it seriously. My husband just happened to be one of the first three matches. When we met, we both knew that it would be a lasting relationship. Working in radio did not last. I ended up going through a program to get my teaching license.

After being married three years and teaching, came the birth of our daughter, Mackenzie. My husband told me to start looking for a horse. He knew I loved them and missed riding. I found Blue, my sorrel paint soon after. I knew she would be perfect for me when I would try to approach her and she would come up to me then take off running as fast as she could. I learned that she had been abused and did not trust anyone. I did not give up. I bought her and worked with her as much as I could. I kept her at a friend's house since we lived in a neighborhood. I brought her to an Mile Hi race in Castle Rock and gave barrel racing another try. She ran the pattern in 29 seconds. Since then Blue and I have been working with a few trainers and both of us have improved. We moved to Elizabeth four and a half years ago to horse property. Having Blue right outside helped me put more time into her training, but her tiny feet don't handle the stress of several races very well. She's on a break while I work with my very tall horse Charlie.

I purchased a new and very tall horse in September of 2007. He was so new to me that I couldn't give up on him. I ran eight out of nine months pregnant, and he really took care of me. Now that my second daughter, Kaycee, is a year old, I can really put the speed on and focus on being more competitive. We built an arena a year ago and I use those pretty purple Mile Hi barrels to practice.

I now stay home with my daughters. My husband and I own our own company, Custom Investigative Services, and I do the administration part. That is the trade off for being home. Every mom needs a hobby. Mine is unique to all the other stay at home mothers that I know, but I love it and I would never trade barrel racing for scrapbooking or any other crafty thing.

I would not be able to live my dream of barrel racing if I did not have the support of my husband. He helped me get back into horses and he watches the girls over those long weekends. He is also very patient after I have made my run and want to stay and watch for awhile.
